• I did not know where to start & what to do

I didn't get it right in 1997 but by 1998 I knew where to start!

• From there Ethics evolved to Ethics 1, 2 & 3

• And with it addressing Ethics in the classroom

• In this I'm indebted to my students

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• Ethics is important

- You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart ...
 And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets' (Mt 22:37-39)
- 'Only let your manner of life be worthy of the gospel' (Phil 1:27)

If the gospel is important ethics is important!

- I have **2 choices** in answering 'Addressing ethical issues in the classroom'
- Taking a single ethical topic & show how I would tackle it in class
 - I'm rejecting that as we've all done that
 - To choose one issue & one or two ways to handle it is just too narrow
- 2. Look at the **Big Picture**: how we address ethical issues in the 3 year curriculum
 - So we'll look our overall Ethics programme
 - And how & what issues we address

- Ethics is a core theological discipline
- The GWC Ethics programme goes hand in hand with a solid grounding in:
 - systematic & historical theology
 - biblical theology
 - & knowledge of the Bible

Before addressing ethical issues we have to lay a solid foundation in biblical theology & the relation between law & gospel

We teach a Christian ethics that is rooted in the law, fulfilled in the gospel & lived out in the world



- We believe that while ethical principles are built into the creation they are explicitly revealed in the Mosaic law
 - Natural law is insufficient to discover ethics as both creation & our minds are fallen
- The law was for Israel yet it is not abolished but fulfilled by Christ through his life & death (Mt 5:17)

- Christ's fulfilment of the law means one cannot just jump directly from the Mosaic law to today to resolve contemporary ethical problems
- One has to go via Christ
- All the OT, including the law, has to be interpreted in the light of Christ & his work (Lk 24:27, 44-45)
 - Cf 1 Cor 9:21: 'not being outside the law of God but under the law of Christ'
- This is not always easy

- The Mosaic law is the foundation of ethics in the Bible so we give a detailed exposition of the ten commandments
 - with reference to the case laws which expound & apply the law
 - & try to interpret them in the light of the apostolic teaching in the NT
- The fulfilment of ethics is found in the gospel so we look at gospel ethics in year 2



• Ethics is covered in 3 semesters over 3 years

- The Big Picture
- The Gospel & Christian Ethics*
 - Resurrection & creation
 - 'Christian ethics depends on the resurrection' O'Donovan
 - The Spirit & freedom

• * Oliver O'Donovan, The Resurrection of Moral Order, ch 1

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- New Testament Ethics
- We look at NT ethics through the **focal images*** of:
 - Community (church)
 - Cross
 - New creation
- This is a cross-shaped ethics, a gospel ethics
- * Richard Hays, The Moral Vision of the New Testament



• Year 2

- African Ethical Issues
- Students choose African ethical topics, work in groups & present to the rest of the class
- Topics will be listed later

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• Year 2

Violence

- Should Christians renounce violence?*
- Motivation: violence is endemic in South African society
 & conflict abounds in Africa
- Must exegete Mt 5:38-48 & relevant NT texts
- Must read Peace Church scholars on non-violence/ pacifism (introducing a new tradition)

* This is not a just war essay

- One semester, 28 x 50 mins lectures
- Discrimination racial & gender
- Professional Ethics: pastoral ministry
- Sexual & social ethics presentations

• Year 1

- While still introducing ethics the students do 2 miniassignments on ethical issues
- 1. Key arguments 1
- Students choose one of 26 topics & list 5 key arguments
 - e.g. Arguments against female genital mutilation
 - Is it right to download copyright music?
- Each argument is one, at most 2, sentences
- Students struggle to identify arguments, especially the key arguments

• Year 1

- 2. Key arguments 2
- Identify 3 key arguments & develop in a paragraph
- A key skill in moral persuasion
- In preaching one has to be able to argue cogently & convincingly, focussing on a few key arguments



• Year 1

- 3. Thesis of a book
- Students identify the thesis of Christopher Ash's Marriage: sex in the service of God & from ch 7 list the arguments in support of his thesis
- Students learn to discern an author's arguments most find it difficult!
- Bonus: discover the purpose/s of marriage & what sort of partner to look for if they're going to serve God together!



• Year 1

- 4. Letter to the Editor
- Write a letter on a trending (or new) ethical topic & submit to a major local newspaper without Bible bashing
- About a third get published!
- The students generally do quite well in this assignment



• Year 1

Group assignment

• Students in groups of 4-5 research a topic & present in a tutorial (10-15 mins), followed by discussion

• Topics chosen in 2016:

- Creation stewardship
- Human rights
- Racism
- Abortion
- Same-sex marriage

• Year 2

African Ethical Issues

- Group assignment
- Students suggest many topics & then vote
- 2016 topics:
 - Land reform
 - Initiation
 - The Big Man Syndrome
 - Bribery
 - Should Christians enter politics?

• Year 3

1. Discrimination

- Main focus is **racism** tribalism is included
- Secondary focus on gender discrimination
- An opportunity to do a topic in depth
 10 lecture periods + 3 movies

• Year 3

1. Discrimination

- Lecture: Ethnicity & race
- Sharing our stories of racism/gender discrimination
- Theory: Jonathan Jansen's Bearing whiteness
- White privilege listening to one another
- Gender discrimination video & discussion

1. Discrimination

- The gospel & ethnicity: transforming our churches
- Reading: John Piper, Bloodlines (selections)
- Theory: Miroslav Volf, Exclusion & Embrace (selections)
- Writing: Reflection on racism (based on the whole series)

• 1. Discrimination

 Movies: students must choose, watch & discuss 3 assigned movies e.g.:

- Cry freedom (compulsory for South Africans)
- Red Dust
- Skin
- Shooting Dogs
- To Kill a Mockingbird
- The Help
- Selma

• Year 3

• 2. Professional Ethics for Pastors

Professional ethics

- in law schools, medical schools, business schools
- rarely in theological colleges

• Examine & discuss **3 codes of ethics** for pastors

• Year 3

• 3. Sexual & Social Ethics

• Final term: students present papers on chosen topics

- Formal response
- Class discussion
- Major research paper

progressive involvement of students

- Year 1 mainly participative lectures + group presentations
- Year 3 mainly student participation & presentations

Conclusion

• In addressing ethical issues we cover:

– A wide variety of topics e.g.:

- personal issues marriage, lobolo, honouring parents, child discipline, copying music, abortion, sexual ethics
- justice issues capital punishment, restorative justice
- political issues human rights, hate speech
- social & economic issues land, poverty, corruption
- environmental issues appreciation & stewardship of nature
- Western topics homosexuality, consumerism
- African topics initiation, FGM, sexism, authoritarianism
