Prof Dr P. J. (Flip) Buys (BA, Th.B., Th.M., Th.D.) has many years of experience in missions and theological education. He is the founder of Mukhanyo Theological College and several other ministries. He is a minister of the Reformed Churches of South Africa (GKSA), and an experienced pastor, cross cultural missionary, church planter and theological educator. He is a professor at North-West University and as Associate International Director of World Reformed Fellowship. He and his wife have two children and one grandchild.



Dr John Carson (M.Div, Ph.D) was ordained in 1973 and pastored two churches near Charlotte, NC. 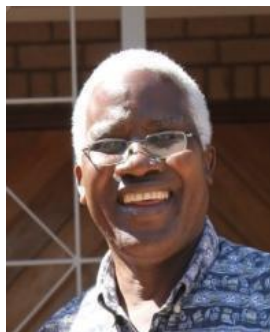
